Subject: Submission under Article 15 of the Rome Statute – Alleged Complicity of the			
United Kingdom in the Genocide and Crimes Against Humanity Committed During the Nigerian			
Civil War (1967–1970)			

I. INTRODUCTION

This submission is made pursuant to **Article 15(1)** of the Rome Statute, requesting that the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court open a preliminary examination into the **alleged** complicity of the United Kingdom government, British Petroleum (BP), and the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) in genocide and crimes against humanity committed during the Nigerian Civil War, also referred to as the **Biafran Genocide**.

It is submitted on behalf of **Truth Over Empire**, a grassroots justice initiative advocating for reparative justice and international accountability for colonial and post-colonial crimes, in collaboration with survivor communities and international legal scholars.

II. JURISDICTIONAL FRAMEWORK

Although the United Kingdom is not accused of directly committing genocidal acts in Nigeria, this communication asserts that the **UK's material support**, **political interference**, **and corporate collusion constituted complicity** in crimes within the jurisdiction of the ICC, namely:

- **Genocide** (Article 6)
- Crimes Against Humanity (Article 7)

Additionally, the **continued withholding of critical evidence**, suppression of truth, and obstruction of survivor justice could be construed as **ongoing violations**, relevant under the **"continuing effects doctrine."**

III. SUMMARY OF FACTS

A. The Biafran War (1967–1970)

- Approximately 1 to 3 million people, primarily of Igbo ethnicity, perished due to blockades, aerial bombardments, starvation, and forced displacement.
- Eyewitnesses, international aid workers, and journalists described the conflict as "a calculated war of extermination".
- The Nigerian federal government, led by General Yakubu Gowon, carried out policies targeting Biafran civilians—including food embargoes, destruction of relief centers, and indiscriminate killings.

B. UK Involvement

- The **UK government**, led by Prime Minister Harold Wilson, **provided direct military support** to the Nigerian government during the conflict, including:
 - Supply of Hawker Hunter jets, small arms, and armored vehicles.
 - Diplomatic support at the United Nations to block peace negotiations and humanitarian interventions.
- British Petroleum (BP) ensured continuous oil exports from war-torn Nigeria, profiting directly from conflict-ridden oil fields.
- The **BBC**, a state-funded broadcaster, **systematically distorted coverage**, discrediting humanitarian concerns and justifying UK policy.

IV. LEGAL BASIS FOR COMPLICITY

A. Genocide – Article 6 of the Rome Statute

Under the **Genocide Convention**, the UK may be liable for:

• **Complicity in genocide** (Article 3(e) of the Genocide Convention)

- Facilitating conditions intended to destroy, in whole or in part, the Igbo ethnic group through:
 - Arms and financial support for genocidal military campaigns
 - Political and diplomatic protection for perpetrators
 - Economic incentives linked to the conflict (notably oil)

B. Crimes Against Humanity - Article 7

The UK's support materially aided:

- Extermination (Article 7(1)(b))
- Persecution against an identifiable group (Article 7(1)(h))
- Inhumane acts causing great suffering (Article 7(1)(k))

These were widespread and systematic, with foreseeability of consequences.

V. EVIDENCE SUBMITTED

This submission is supported by:

- Declassified British Government documents (1966–1975)
- Testimonies from survivors and humanitarian aid workers
- Reports from international observers and NGOs
- Historical accounts, photographs, and documented starvation policies
- Academic publications and investigative journalism

VI. REQUEST FOR ACTION

We respectfully request that the Office of the Prosecutor:

- 1. **Initiate a preliminary examination** into the role of the United Kingdom and its institutions in the Biafran Genocide.
- 2. **Engage with survivor communities and diaspora organizations** for further testimonies.
- 3. Investigate the ongoing **denial**, **cover-up**, **and suppression** of evidence and the UK's failure to acknowledge or redress its role.

VII. CONCLUSION

The mass death of civilians in Biafra constitutes one of the most egregious atrocities in post-colonial African history. The UK government's complicity, driven by **geopolitical interests** and economic gain, enabled and prolonged the suffering of millions.

Justice delayed is justice denied—but justice must not be silenced.

We call on the ICC to uphold its mandate to fight impunity—especially when the perpetrators are powerful and the victims forgotten.
